


On behalf of every man whose life has been touched by your compassion and generosity, we thank you.

#### PETER'S STORY

"I wanted to give up on myself, but the Mission wouldn't let me."



Peter's life came to an instant halt the day his wife of 16 years passed away. He didn't know how to go on without her. At 71 years old, Peter felt like he had nothing left in life to contribute and tried to take his own life.

After being discharged from the hospital, and with nowhere else to go, Peter came to the Allentown Rescue Mission.

At first Peter was apprehensive, but he formed a brotherhood with other guests. He then talked through his feelings of worthlessness and listened to messages of hope in the Transformation Program. Soon Peter's perspective shifted, and he began to smile, something he never thought would happen again.

Now 4 years after his wife's passing, Peter feels like his life is moving forward again. He recently earned a job in the Mission's kitchen. He and his wife loved to cook together, and to honor her, he had considered culinary training. To his surprise, the Mission's kitchen manager has taken him under his wing and is teaching Peter restaurant skills for when he leaves the shelter.

Peter still misses his wife every day, but he isn't worried about his future anymore. "The Mission has opened up so many doors for me. I'm looking forward to what life has in store for me."
